I have at last been able to arrange my itinerary so that I can this time include Berlin. I deeply regret that we shall not be able to stop more than a few days. As I believe I wrote you, Frances is in Geneva, where we have put Astrid into school. We shall leave the child there, but Frances will accompany me to Berlin.

My itinerary is as follows:

Dec. 16 to 22. London. Carlton Hotel.

Dec. 22 to 30. Paris. Hotel Crillon.

Dec. 30 to Jan 2. Geneva. Thomas Cook & Son.

Jan 2 to 10. Berlin. American Express Co.

Jan. 10 to 16. Vienna. Thomas Cook & Son, 2 Stefansplatz.

Jan. 17 to 18. Geneva. Thomas Cook & Son.

Jan. 19. Genoa, sailing for Alexandria on SS "Esperia".

If you should need to reach me by letter or telegram you can use any of the above addresses.

I was very glad to have your cable with the single word "Sixty", as agreed. I am making my representations in accordance with this cablegram, and as such matters do not move rapidly, I shall probably not have a definite official reply for some time, possibly not even when I have reached Berlin. But I have great hope of a favorable result.
